#### Alphabet Soup Responding Well to Treatmen by Bryan M. Waldridge, DVM, MS, DABVP, DACVIM Park Equine Hospital at Woodford

Alphabet Soup is continuing to respond very well to his treatment for melanoma. He was treated with a vaccine produced by Morphogenesis, which was made from cells from his own tumors. Alphabet Soup received a series of eight injections over five months and is also treated with cimetidine, which is an anti-ulcer drug with some effects to help the immune system fight melanoma.

I could not be more pleased with Alphabet Soup's response. I estimate that his melanomas have reduced about 80% in size and continue to shrink. He looks like he could still race! Melanomas are a common problem in gray horses over 15 years of age. Unlike human melanoma, these masses are caused by changes in the melanocytes (pigment cells) of gray horses as they age and turn from gray to white.

Usually, equine melanomas are slow growing and most likely to cause problems only locally where they grow. In Alphabet Soup, the cancer was around his tail head where it could eventually interfere with passage of manure. We elected to start more aggressive treatment before the masses were large enough to cause significant problems.

I am very hopeful that this treatment will be further developed and, one day, help more horses and be applicable for humans. I greatly appreciate the advice and support from everyone at Morphogenesis who were always interested in his progress.
