New Old Friends retiree Rocketry, aka Rocky, (insert inspirational prize-fighter music here) was a contender right out of the gate, commanding \$195,000 as a 2015 Keeneland November weanling bought by McMahon & Hill Bloodstock. The following September, he was back in the sales ring, and this time the drop-dead-gorgeous son of Hard Spun out of the Smart Strike mare, Smart Farming, commanded \$450,000 from new owners, Centennial Farm.

Conditioned at Centennial's Middleburg Training Center in Virginia, the colt was then sent to veteran conditioner Jimmy Jerkens as a two-year-old. Once in gear, Rocketry proved he wasn't going to be pulling any punches. He broke his maiden impressively on turf at Belmont Park during his sophomore season, After the win, the *Thoroughbred Daily News* dubbed him a "Rising Star". No kidding! Rocky went on to beat older horses at Saratoga and mixed it up with future G1 winners Voodoo Song, Yoshida, and eventual Horse of the Year Bricks and Mortar in the G3 Saranac.

A fan favorite thanks to his thrilling, Zenyatta-esque, late-running style, Rocketry proved he could not only go the distance – the long distance--but he could go it *fast*! In 2018, his banner 4-year-old year, he captured the 1-5/8 mile Temperence Hill Invitational Stakes, besting a 98-year-old track record held by Man o' War in the process. Later that year he earned his first graded stakes victory in the G2 Marathon Stakes at Churchill Downs, again setting a new track record, this time for the 1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> miles.

In his 6-year-old campaign Rocketry went for the total knockout, adding a third track record to his resume, this time going 1-5/8 miles in 2:42.57 at Keeneland, and picking up another graded victory in the G2 Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance Stakes.

Rocketry threw in the towel a few starts later, finishing 4<sup>th</sup> in the Birdstone Stakes at Saratoga. It was his 29<sup>th</sup> break from the gate and he closed his career with a whopping \$811,577 in earnings. At age 7 and still sound, he has earned his retirement.

Don Little, Jr., President of Centennial Farms, said, "Being involved with a horse like this was truly a joy, thrill, and one that will be cherished by all the partners involved. While he will be missed on the oval, we look forward to him showing off to visitors at Old Friends."

According to Michael, "Who doesn't love Rocketry? We're very fortunate that Centennials Farms trusts us to care for their great marathoner. Thanks to Don Little, Jr. and Jimmy Jerkins for allowing us to showcase him to his many fans!"

## What Love Does To You

When I was just betting horses, their lives were summed up by Beyer Speed Figures and assorted other numbers that crystallized their careers. The past performances are still a remarkable example of condensing each athlete's life into a digest of races, earnings, connections, age, breeding and dozens of other factors available to handicappers. I still read *Daily Racing Form* with an enthusiasm that my grandmother brought to her daily Bible readings. Over the past 49 years, through spectacular wins and excruciating defeats, their lives could be reduced to abstractions. Not anymore.

Old Friends has taught me that each of these horses, whether a stakes winner or an old claimer, has an individual personality. Some I like, some I respect, some I tolerate, and some I love. And my latest love is Private Charm. She had only seven starts, all at Evangeline Downs in 2006 with two wins and one place and lifetime earnings of \$27,120. On July 28, 2006, she got a DNF (did not finish). Subsequently, she became a broodmare with offspring that mirrored her dismal racing career. But, when you're in love, none of that matters.

A few months ago, I got a call from Shirley Ford, a longtime supporter from Texas. She told me about a daughter of Silver Charm who was in a precarious situation and she, and many others, were mounting a campaign to give the 20-year-old a dignified retirement. It meant we would have to leapfrog her over several other deserving candidates and, as far as I'm concerned, nepotism matters – especially when my favorite horse of all time, Silver Charm, is involved.

Several weeks later, after some rest and relaxation, she arrived at Old Friends, looking a little rugged. But she was, and is, the spitting image of her sire. And, after all she'd been through, she was extraordinarily kind and generous with her soulful brown eyes and her beautiful way of nuzzling my chest. There I go again. But that's what love does to you.

After a trip to Rood and Riddle, where she was successfully operated on for a sinus infection by Dr. Scott Morrison, she settled in. And, even with a dozen or so staples looking like a zipper down her nose, she was beautiful. And Dr. Morrison, admitting that he didn't remember the last time he performed surgery on a 20-year-old barren mare with a dismal track record, said she was a marvelous patient.

Now, she's outside in a paddock where she'll eventually have a roommate. At dusk, when the sun's last rays filter through her gorgeous white mane and reflects of her beautiful body . . . oh, never mind. That's what love does to you.

I'm forever grateful to you for supporting us and helping Private Charm find her forever home.

## The Grass and Nothing But the Grass by Cynthia Grisolia

In late summer Old Friends welcomed two new retirees: Zulu Alpha, a son of Street Cry out of the A.P. Indy mare Zori; and Next Shares, the near-black offspring of Archarcharch—calling in his "Old Friend for Life" marker after capturing the 2018 Old Friends Stakes at Kentucky Downs. The two had different owners,



different trainers, and probably different jockeys, though they did cross paths at least once, back in January 2020 when Zulu Alpha blew by Next Shares to win the Pegasus Turf Invitational at Gulfstream Park. But the dynamic duo does have something significant in comon: They both eschewed the dirt tracks most common in the U.S to triumph on the grass. (Or, in racetrack parlance, the turf.)

Grass, schmass, you say. What's the difference? Well, a lot. Grass or turf racing is the standard in Europe (where Zulu Alpha launched his career, by the way). Here in the states our racetracks offer primarily deep dirt ovals-though many also have additional

grass courses. Dirt is cheaper to install, easier to maintain, and less reliant on weather conditions. So there are fewer grass races and fewer opportunities

to race and win over the turf. But the grass isn't greener for everyone. Horses usually favor one surface or the other, just like some excel at shorter or longer distances (see Go Long, about Rocketry). And some horses are just better built for the lawn. Taller bodies, wider, flatter hooves, and heavier conformation are a few of the characteristics that help point a horse toward the grass, where skimming over the surface—as opposed to bogging down in the dirt-gives them more speed. There are also some horses with genuine grass roots: Both Zulu's and Next Shares's dams (Zori and Two Dot Slew, respectively), were grass horses, so a propensity for the turf was already in their blood. And then, of course, there are those freaks of nature that defy the odds and run on anything. Old Friends retiree Einstein, for instance, was a five-time G1 winner and was among the first horses to have victories on all three track surfaces: dirt, turf, and synthetic. (Yes, there are also synthetic

track surfaces, but we'll open that crazy can of a Pandora's box in another article.)

Whatever the reason, both of these athletes did their best flying over the flora. Zulu Alpha began his career in Ireland where he made four starts before returning to the U.S. Claimed in 2018 by Michael Hui, he was immediately pointed toward the 2019 Calumet Turf Cup, which he won by an airy 3 1/4 lengths. Zulu Alpha went on to win seven graded stakes, retiring with 12 wins from 37 starts, for earnings of \$2,269,084.

A Richard Baltas trainee and owned in partnership, Next Shares retired this year after seven seasons with a record of seven wins from 49 starts and earnings of

\$1.891,971. A multiple graded stakes

winner, Next Shares followed his Old Friends Stakes win with a victory in the 2018 G1 Shadwell Turf Mile at Keeneland, the G2 San Gabriel Stakes at Santa Anita, and the G2 Seabiscuit at Del Mar in 2019.

But all that running is behind them. These days, Zulu Alpha and Next Shares will just be enjoy the splendor of our grass...and mud.

If you have visited Old Friends and taken a tour, you have met one of our wonderful volunteer tour guides.
