Eyes Forward with John Nicholson

It hits me hard and in the same way every time I hear Michael Blowen speak on the video seen by thousands of our annual visitors. He speaks of how he founded Old Friends and that it then grew “organically” into what it has now become. What it has become is an institution recognized as being at the forefront and is often seen as the face for the Aftercare of Thoroughbred racehorses.

The International Forum for the Aftercare of Racehorses (IFAR) Annual Conference was held in Kentucky this year. The conference had participants from 13 countries and serves as the singular authoritative body to speak to how Thoroughbred racehorses are to be treated once their earning years are over. Having the conference in Kentucky was an important milestone, not only for Aftercare in the United States, but also for Old Friends itself.

Even though this was my first opportunity to interact with this organization, I was

pleased to be invited to participate in a Q and A panel regarding the administration of an Aftercare facility. This was a tribute to the widespread reputation Old Friends has earned over the last two decades. It was a particularly historic day for Old Friends when the conference gathered on Dream Chase for tours, remarks and a convivial lunch.

I received favorable comments from many of the participants when I spoke of the need to begin to address and educate our industry not only about the importance of Aftercare, but also about the realities of the costs that are being borne by our farms and facilities around the world to undertake this important work.

Every day at our five Old Friends farms we care for the health and wellbeing of nearly three hundred thoroughbred souls. No matter their achievements on the track, whether historic or pedestrian, whether memorable or not, they all receive the love and care worthy of Old Friends family members.

In recent times, the Thoroughbred industry has fully embraced the need for Aftercare of our athletes. The remarkable growth of Old Friends is a reflection of that commitment. Having fully embraced Aftercare, the industry as a whole needs to recognize that this commitment must also be accompanied with the resources to care for these horses.

Perhaps the Chair of IFAR, Dr. Eliot Forbes said it best: “Some argue that deepening our commitment is costly. That it adds complexity. But the truth is, embedding aftercare and welfare into the heart of the industry isn’t just an ethical imperative – it’s a strategic one. A horse-centered model protects our social license. It attracts new participants and fans. It enhances the longevity and marketability of the Thoroughbred well beyond its racing years.” Thank you, Eliot. Well said.

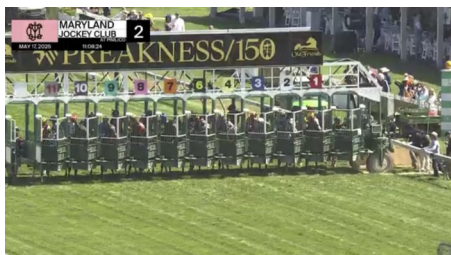

In a one-month span, Champion Big Blue Kitten and his most successful son, Cellist arrived from Calumet Farm and entered retirement at Old Friends.

Over the years, Old Friends has been the retirement home for several father/son duos that include some very special horses:

The late champion, **Gulch**, retired to Old Friends four years before his stakes-winning son, Bobby Sands arrived;

We are very partial to sons of the phenomenal **Awesome Again**, including Game on Dude, Awesome Gem, Daaher, Count Again, Racketeer and Rumor Has It;

Grade-one winning Seek Gold arrived at Old Friends six years before his sire **Touch Gold** stepped off the van;

New York graded stakes winner **Albert the Great** retired one year after son Nobiz Like Shobiz, with a second son, Albertus Maximus, rolling in five years later.

Bellamy Road claimed his Old Friends paddock two years after his sons, New York-bred Horse of the Year Diversify and Brilliant Decision moved in; and

Any Given Saturday returned to Kentucky from South Korea one year after son Adventist retired.

In keeping with this stellar tradition, earlier this year two residents of Calumet Farm knocked on our door. **Big Blue Kitten**, 2015 Eclipse Champion Grass Horse, newly retired from a breeding career, and his best racing son, **Cellist**, arrived within weeks of each other. And who better to introduce them to you than those folks who know them best!

The Inside Scoop on Big Blue Kitten

Big Blue Kitten has been a participant on our regular tour route since April, and our guides have observed that he has all the curiosity of a feline! Our Kitten has discovered some important things come with his new status as an Old Friends retiree. First off, he doesn't have to do anything he doesn't want to do. Well, except for basic maintenance stuff with feet and teeth. He's also figured out that visitors stop by his paddock daily, and they come with treats! He's still trying to decide whether it's the carrots or the Mrs. Pasture's cookies that have won his heart. But he has time to ponder that decision. After all, he's retired!

From Cellist's Family

Cellist has a huge personality and always kept the barn staff on their toes! He was never mean, just a lot of energy. 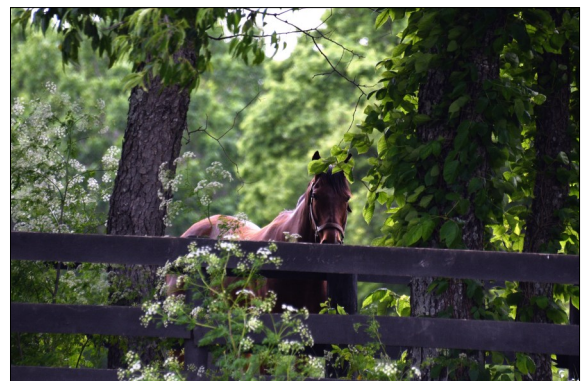

The Grand Old Men of the Triple Crown: Silver Charm and Touch Gold

While this year's rendition of the Triple Crown provided plenty of thrills and new stars blazing onto racing's biggest stage, here at Old Friends the spotlight shone brightly on two of our retirees who are inextricably linked in Triple Crown lore.

There are many reasons why I like gazing out my kitchen window, but the main reason is to have my heart filled with the joy in knowing that Silver Charm, at 31, is gumming the grass and his Mrs. Pastures cookie crumbs. Imagine how your life would be enriched by such a daily vision? It's indescribable.

And, in a neighboring paddock, also at 31, his long-time rival Touch Gold. Forget Ali and Fraser, Sinner and Alcaraz. When Silver Charm and Touch Gold went at it, your hair stands up and salutes. I remember. I used to have hair.

While they no longer compete, and their lives basically involve eating and greeting, they are no less glorious. In fact, I'd say they are more valuable now than 28 years ago when they were competing in the Triple Crown races—Silver Charm's Preakness and Touch Gold's Belmont. Now, they're just chewing. Just relaxing. Just being themselves. They have lost

some weight and they don't run as fast, but they have grown in so many other ways.

They know they are now in charge of their lives. They set the schedule. They carve out the routine. They seem to know that thousands of visitors come to appreciate them every year. They've surrendered the demands of competition and replaced them with Zen-like countenances. I know, like them, that we're headed down the final furlong.

Silver Charm, at 31 racing's oldest living Kentucky Derby and Preakness Stakes winner, spent Derby week sur-

rounded by adoring fans and friends. The high-

light was the May 2-4 edition of *USA Today*,

which featured a

front page story on the "Derby's grand old man" eloquently penned by Dan Wolken.



Touch Gold, at 31 racing's oldest living Belmont Stakes winner (at the expense of fellow retiree Silver Charm), had a rooting interest in this year's race, as the third generation grandsire of fourth place finisher, Rodriguez. Fox Sports/NYRA visited the farm to catch some Touch Gold video for their pre-race show, and we were overjoyed to have one more hurrah for this Belmont elder statesman.

A little more than a decade after the Triple Crown season of Old Friends retirees Silver Charm and Touch Gold, Big Brown swept onto the stage and created his own brand of classic race magic, capturing both the 2008 Kentucky Derby and Preakness Stakes. After an unplaced finish in the Belmont thwarted his Triple Crown bid, Big Brown

went on to victory in the G1 Haskell Invitational before retiring from racing with earnings of \$3.6 million. A stud career that began in 2009 saw Big Brown stand at Three Chimneys Farm in Kentucky, and shuttle to Australia from 2010-2014. Moving to New York in 2015, he landed at Irish Hill and Dutchess Views Farm for nine years, concluding his breeding career in September of 2024 and arriving at Old Friends to begin life in retirement.

History will reflect that at stud, Big Brown would need only to

sire one foal to cement his place in Thoroughbred breeding history. On May 17, 2012 a bay filly was born in Kentucky. Named Puca, she would go on to be a Grade 2 placed stakes-winner of \$300,000 for owners Donegal Racing and Paul Pompa, Jr.

Retired after four seasons at the track, Puca's broodmare career started off well enough in 2019,

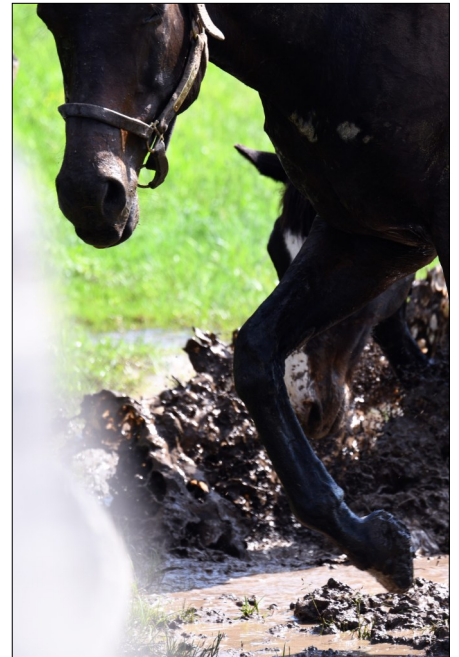
with Gunning, a winning filly by Gun Runner. In 2020 and 2021 Puca would kick into high gear, producing 2023 Kentucky Derby winner Mage, and 2024 Belmont Stakes winner Dornoch. In doing so, she became one of only a handful of mares to produce two US classic race winners.

Fast-forward to this year's Triple Crown season, and Puca's name once again figured prominently. Fresh off being named the 2024 Broodmare of the Year by the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association, Puca's son, Baeza, earned headlines as he made a major bid to join half-siblings Mage and Dornoch as classic race winners. He came up just short, finishing third in both the Derby and Belmont, but still did Puca and Big Brown proud!

Sold in 2023 for \$2.9 million to John Stewart's Resolute Farm, Puca has produced two full siblings to Mage and Dornoch who are yet to race. Are they destined to add to Puca's Triple Crown lore? We'll have to wait to find out.

As is true with everything involving Big Brown, no doubt we'll be in for a lot of thrills along the way.

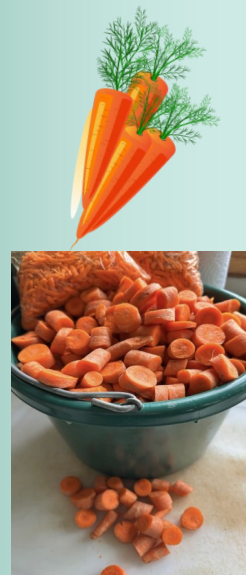

The World According to Little Silver Charm

I was pretty excited when they told me I was one of only three horses on the farm selected for a treatment by Dr. Mizuno, a specialist at Rood and Riddle, the world famous equine hospital. The other horses were (Big) Silver Charm and Touch Gold, so I figured the treatment must be a big deal. Nobody told me that needles would be involved. Help! I hate needles!



Mary Greene took this quite exceptional photo of me, Dr. Misuno, and the needles.

Dr. Misuno explained he wouldn't be poking me with big hypodermic needles, but skinny little acupuncture needles that I would barely feel. He said that the treatment would help lessen chronic pain. Like most older horses I have lots of that.

He applied lots of needles to my back. Just as he promised, I felt so much better after the treatment. I don't know how it works, but it does.

Both (Big) Silver Charm and Touch Gold weren't at all bothered by their acupuncture treatments. In fact, I would guess they've had acupuncture before. Now I can say I have, too!

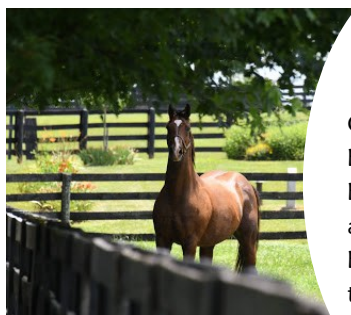
